New Business

Budget Presentation — Akemi (Finance Committee: Kelsey, Akemi, Brooke, Barb)

The proposed budget is included in the 2022 Fall Assembly Minutes packet. Akemi walks us through the budget line by line, explaining the reasoning behind each recommendation. Members raised the following questions:

Line A1 – Equalized expense: How much is the equalized expense? And what is the reasoning for paying the full actual amount? Akemi reports that she does not have the actual figure today, it is around \$1,800. The committee felt that as we have the funds to be able to be fully self-supporting that we would elect to do so. There is discussion about our history of only paying the equalized amount and a vote will taken to decide whether to pay the actual or equalized amount.

Line U – Annual Website expense, is it really \$1,200 per year? Some discussion, about the actual costs. Mana reports that the website design and construction cost was \$4,920.

Now we have to cover the annual cost of hosting and domain name maintenance. Akemi will determine the actual amount and amend the budget to reflect. David asks if the final decision on the website contract was properly voted on. We will research and return to this question.

Composition of the Budget Committee, isn't there supposed to be a past delegate? Kelsey reads from the Hawaii Area Policies and Procedures: "Budget Committee, shall consist of treasurer, immediate past treasurer and two additional members who have served on the area committee and remained involved in area activities."

Carolyn moves that we return to our usual practice of paying the equalized amount. Second by Tom.

Discussion: What is equalized amount? The cost to travel to the World Service Conference varies because of the distance that must be traveled by the delegate to the conference. Some can drive a relatively short distance, most must fly, delegates from the west coast, Hawaii and Alaska have substantially higher air fare costs. The total cost of the Conference travel is divided, and an average is suggested as the equalized amount. Not all areas pay the full equalized amount, several areas pay the full actual amount. We have traditionally paid the equalized amount. It is pointed out that our regular meeting expenses are higher than other areas because we need to fly between islands to meet, additionally, we have a very small population to support our financial needs.

Roll call is taken, 36 GRs =24 for substantial majority. The vote is 5 abstentions, taking total votes needed down to 31, a majority would be 21. Of the remaining 31 votes, 9 no, 22 yes. The motion passes.

Lunch Break

We resume after lunch with the vote count:

Section 1 - 28 yes, 2 no

Section 2 - 35 yes, 0 no

Section 3 - 32 yes, 1 no

Section 4 - 31 yes, 1 no

A total of 8 abstaining votes were reported

The proposed budget for 2023 is passed by a substantial majority.

A copy of the revised approved budget will be attached to these minutes. Additionally, the Equalized Expense Letter from WSO will also be attached.

We note that, as of this time, we are substantially behind on the day's agenda. We will skip the Coordinator Reports after lunch to try to catch up.

Permanent Electronic Groups Presentation — PEG Work Group

This issue arose out of COVID and also as part of the ongoing work to help the already existing electronic meetings to develop a service structure and to become part of the Al-Anon Family Groups World Service Conference.

As more and more areas have asked for guidance on how to incorporate groups that wish to remain virtual into our area service structure, how to deal with groups that want to have both electronic and in-person simultaneously, and those that want to be in-person only. After much research and work over the past two years, the decision has been made to have two classifications, Electronic and In-Person. There are two options for an electronic group, to be registered in a specific area or to be registered as part of the Global Electronic Area (having no geographic location) or if their area permits, to register as an electronic group in their Area.

There are many issues that we will have to address if we are to have electronic groups in our area, but first we must decide whether we want to make it possible to have electronic groups in Hawaii. If we choose to go this route, we will then form a task force to research how other areas are addressing the issue and to make recommendations to our area on a policy for Hawaii Area electronic groups.

The PEG (Permanent Electronic Group) survey has been circulated among our membership for the past couple of months, the information will be made available on the website.

Alice C moves that we accept permanent electronic groups into the Hawaii Al-Anon structure. Second by Dana C.

Discussion follows:

- groups that are electronic with members from beyond our own island or Hawaii, still want to be located in Hawaii.
- It is important to be able to have the option to register in Hawaii
- Important to develop policy to address, how to select GR, seventh tradition, district membership,
- Will this require that we hold hybrid assemblies?
- If a group has a hybrid option, they will register as "In-Person" with instructions on how to access the two formats.
- etc.

The vote is taken, unanimous vote of yes.

Penni shares that we have just made a historic decision.

Candidates for Area Chair

Thanks to Miranda and Kay for serving as Chairpersons this panel. Penni, as Delegate, has stepped in to chair in this interim since Kay had to resign. It is time for the Assembly to elect a chairperson for the remainder of this Panel (12 months).

Penni asks all members of the Assembly who have been a DR or Area Coordinator and who are not also members of Alcoholics Anonymous to please stand. A substantial number of the Assembly participants stand. We are asked to reflect, to silently say the Serenity Prayer, to prayerfully ask if this is the time we should stand for the position of area chair. If you are not willing to stand for Area Chair, will you please sit down.

David D is the only remaining member standing. We ask David to leave the room.

The membership shares their experience, strength, and hope. Will we need to have a new person step up to be Alateen Coordinator? Yes. David is asked to return to the room to read his resume to the membership. Kelsey reads a summary of the job description. David leaves the room again.

We vote: 34 voting GRs, David is elected by a substantial majority. His term will begin Jan 1, 2023.

Penni opens with a conversation about the Assembly Theme: Reunited in Love and Service. This is what we are experiencing here this weekend. This is the way we work together in Al-Anon.

Love acronym that came from Conference: Listen, Observe, Value, Encourage.

Penni explains the love gifts, some from Panel 58, why we make them, why we share them.

Al-Anon service has taught me a different way to be in the world. It has healed me as a human being, to actually practice the principles of the traditions in all my affairs and to be effective at a different level. The Traditions and Concepts are a transformative tool of this program.

Reports she was in Kaui's position three years ago and she has learned a lot. Windward has lost one group and gained one. *Eileen, Windward. I was in Kaui's position three years ago. Have learned a lot. Did lose one group and gained one.*

1:15–2:15 Alateen in Hawaii Workshop — Ruby (Goal #6)

Hi, I'm Ruby. I'm here to talk to you about Alateen my knowledge, experience, and observations regarding it, and why it's important. Growing up with an alcoholic parent is really difficult and scary. For me. It's been happening for as long as I can remember, what was happening wasn't hidden from me. But I didn't know or understand what was going on. Due to this, I felt hurt, abandoned, angry and afraid. But there was never a loss of love between me and my mom.

After attending Al Anon meetings and being aware that I didn't cause it, I can't control it, and I can't cure it. I now don't blame her. I know that this is because she has a disease and is trying to recover which is an extremely difficult process. One of the main differences between Al Anon and Alateen is the Alateens are younger than 19. We don't have the life experience and knowledge that you all have. Due to that fact, I'm primarily reacting to what is happening around me. I don't know how to respond, cope healthily, process or deal with the experiences I'm growing through. But that's why we're here.

The first Alateen meeting I went to was in 2015, I was 11. Alateen is important for me to have access to so that I can learn I'm not to blame or the source. I'm not the only person in the world going through this pain. The 12 Steps teach us how to accept process and move forward and grow from the effects of the disease of alcoholism. The meetings allow me to share my experiences, worries and fears. One of the most important things I have learned through both Al Anon and Alateen is communication, how to communicate with other members and newcomers myself and the alcoholic. I know for some of the kids, they think the disease is only affecting the alcoholic and not them. There are also kids who don't know the existence of Al Anon or Alateen who are struggling.

Another major factor of Alateen is to get young people introduced and comfortable with the program so they continue to Al-Anon and take up leadership positions not only for others but for themselves bringing the program into the future for everyone through the next generations.

Al Anon and Alateen has caused such a big change that I'm going forward for my senior project as a senior at King K., I'm making a pamphlet of basic information on Al Anon and Alateen and I know that this won't have time to get conference approved before I graduate however, I think it'll really help potential Allah teens to hear it from someone who's of their own age and gone through experience with the program. I would like to include the Serenity Prayer 12 steps, the 12 concepts, the 12 traditions, some statistics, and a rundown on what an Al Anon and Alateen meeting would look like. And I would love your guys' advice and suggestions.

Ruby talks about what makes up a good Alateen meeting, and conversely, a not-so-good.

Ruby closes with her favorite quote from the Invictus poem by William Ernest Henley: "I'm the master of my fate I'm the captain of my soul".

Penni and AMIAS members share on how to bring Alateen programs into our Area and Districts. Penni reports that how to reach out to Alateens is one of the major topics of concern in Al-Anon worldwide.

Can we make these resources available on our website? Yes. Alateen literature, sample letters to school counselors, reports from other Areas. Etc. Ruby and the AMIAS respond to questions. Ruby has a page of links to various Alateen resources and videos. This will be attached to these minutes.

<u>Alternate Delegate's Time</u> — Kelsey

Ask-it-Basket Questions:

- 1. Have any other Areas chosen to go the Global Electronic Area rout rather than allowing PEGs to join their area? *Not yet*.
- 2. There are people in my home group who are very concerned about "crosstalk". What are good ideas and aways to address this issue. What is another word for crosstalk? He Al-Anon term for crosstalk is "loving interchange" The term "crosstalk" is from the therapeutic universe and is not an Al-Anon term. Penni sites an article in the 1989 Forum called "Crosstalk or Loving Interchange" In the article it talks about the difference between being a newcomer and showing up at a meeting and not knowing the rules yet. And if you're greeted with someone that says, That's cross talk, please come back. But don't ever break that rule again. As

opposed to with a loving interchange, being able to pull that newcomer aside after a meeting and say, just want to tell you there's really not a question answer part to the meeting. Let people know we listen, without interrupting to allow every person share. We've seen words like qualifier, dysfunctional, codependent. And crosstalk, and they all come from therapy, you won't find any of those words in Al-Anon literature. So just mindfully remembering that and bringing it to the group so that we just remember that it's not about what we don't do. It's what we do, bring that to the group conscience and say, you know, let's talk about that. How can we express that?

- 3. Why didn't we receive the agenda before Assembly? To be able to represent our groups, we need to know what we will be voting on. My recollection is that we received the agenda 2 weeks before the Assembly in the past. You are right. Penni apologizes for her error in believing that she had sent it out and found it still needed to be sent when she returned to Hawaii. You should be able to download the agenda from the website at least 2 weeks in advance of the Assembly.
- 4. How was the decision made to change "trustees" to "volunteer members"? I don't know the reason (Penni), they (WSO) have consistently for this year, referred to the Trustees as Volunteers. I think just to emphasize the fact that your board members are volunteers and to take away the mystique of the word Trustees. Patti reports the term "Volunteers" was used during Panel 58 as well.
- 5. Still a little confused as to how the money gets split up 7th Tradition vs. WSO vs. quarterly. Each Group, District, and Area is autonomous and must determine the percentages of their Seventh Tradition receipts that they want to send on to support the Al-Anon Family Groups at the Group, District, Area, and World Service levels. They may change these percentages to suit the current needs of their group, district, area, or World Service. Each entity should budget the amount of funds it needs to keep on hand to meet their own expenses (self-supporting) and the balance should be split between District, Area, and World Service. (Warranty 1, Al-Anon Concepts of Service: "that only sufficient operating funds, including an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle")
- 6. Are the Quarterly Collections that we give at in-person meetings, does that go to the WSO? The intention of the WSO Quarterly Appeal letter is to raise funds for WSO. Groups and Districts have the autonomy to decide how they want to divide up contributions.
- 7. Is there a way to read consent agenda items on the Area website, then click on a box to consent (similar to consent forms, acknowledgement, and acceptance of terms on other websites). Yes, you can read the Consent Agenda items on the website, to the second part, we can consider the possibility at our upcoming HAWSC meetings.
- 8. For clarification, now that we have decided to allow Permanent Electronic Groups in Hawaii, what should the unified message from the GRs to the groups be about the next step? There are several next steps. The permanent electronic groups were approved by the Assembly. The Hawaii Area Committee will create a Task Force to define policies and procedures. This Task Force will work with groups, GRs, and DRs from the Areas and they will be sending this information to the Policy Committee. Those recommendations will come back to the Assembly for approval by the GRs.

9. If we decide to have hybrid meetings, can we ask that the people that come on video have to keep their cameras on? And to remain present, active, listening as a "video etiquette"? You can try, there are many reasons why people choose not to have their video on, some having to do with bandwidth.

Open Mic: Reflections, Appreciations, & Gratitudes

- I'm Edo, I wanted to especially thank Kelsey for bringing up to spiritual books, two that are no longer published. Perhaps we could ask our Delegate to encourage the publication of more spiritual books.
- I'm Renee, and I've been in Al Anon, for about a year and a half. I do small jobs like running meetings or put away chairs or things that don't seem too hard. I'm a little bit afraid of overdoing volunteering. But when the subject of needing a substitute GR for our group came up, I thought it would be a good way to do some service and just a finite amount of time. So, I did it. And I'm glad I did, because I'm really getting a really good idea of how Al-Anon works by coming into this meeting. And the topics of the Seventh Tradition and the electronic meeting topics are very timely, because it's something I'm very passionate about, and especially online meetings. It was very rewarding to be able to participate in workshops on these topics. And now I have a much better understanding of how Al-Anon works, the structure of Al Anon, which is kind of hard sometimes to nail down. And as soon as we start talking about some of the stuff, I just sort of glaze over. So, it felt great to do service. It's great to see how much everybody does and really appreciate the Panel and the website, because I can appreciate how much time goes into all of this and really appreciate it. One thing I did see is that there is a core group that's really devoted. And I think some of the technical issues like the microphones not working could be delegated to maybe some of the participants who come in so that the main people aren't having to take care of every little aspect. I don't know, maybe whatever. Anyway, so thanks, everybody really enjoyed my time looking forward to participating more and more on different levels as time goes by.
- Hi, I'm Ginelle. I was hoping for this opportunity to share, I'll just say that I am nearing the end of my three-year term as a GR for Super Saturday. It has not always been an easy sojourn, but I wouldn't trade it for the world. Because when they say do service, it advances your recovery, it does exactly that. And as I shared with someone, we don't come into these rooms, because we're wanting someone else to tell us what to do. We think we're coming in to tell everybody else how to do it. And then we find out. So, I just want to say that I believe that having this in person assembly has brought together our meeting members. They have really pulled together; I am so proud of every single person from Super Saturday. They stepped up almost to a person to help bring this assembly off. And it's also I believe, has brought together our East Hawaii District, you know, all the way from Wyoming down to Kea'au and points south, So when I first I heard about this assembly and I thought, Oh, we're gonna have this COVID thing and whatnot. And I don't know if I want to be there and blah, blah, blah. And the story. This has been not only inspiring, but it has been instrumental, I believe in furthering not only my recovery, recover every person in this room.
- Hi, Kaui again, I just want to, first of all, thank the East Hawaii district for such a wonderful
 welcoming, warm assembly this fall. I also want to thank our Hawaii Area officers, who I can see
 put a lot of work and effort into meeting all of our needs here and doing their best in answering
 all of our questions. That is a hard job. I appreciate all of you. The question that says, What are
 you excited about? And, you know, this whole issue about the permanent electronic groups is something

I was nervous about, because I am not the most techie person at all. But I believe that learning is lifelong. And I'm excited to be part of the discussion about how we're going to move forward with this. So, thank you all. Thank you so much.

- Aloha, I'm Eugene from Kauai. And this has really been a great experience to see most of you without your mask, I was able to recognize you, maybe for the first time. And also, when you know, when I see you on Zoom, you know, I don't know if you're shorter, tall, or big or small. I was also to see you as you really are. And I want to thank the Hawaii Area committee and our hosts for this wonderful venue. I think everything went well, the check-in and the food. There were a couple hotel staff that were here I that made it made it very comfortable, maybe they just resupplied the water or the coffee or just made it safe on the floor. That was an extra. And that is what is so beautiful about our program is the love and the support and the encouragement we share with one another. I'm really touched, and I thank all of you for your concern your prayers and well wishes. And I think considering it's been a while since we've had an assembly, we did pretty damn good. Thanks.
- Hi, I'm Mary, the DR For Central District. And for those of you who have who have just a little bit of experience as GRs or maybe you're not in service yet, you're just members who are attending, I just want to share that I think it was four years ago, was my first time here in Hilo, and I bumped into a couple of people who I haven't seen since then. And they have expressed to me how much at peace, and how much they've seen me grow in this program. And it's because of service, it's because of all of you. And my higher power, and I just encourage anybody who might be struggling in their program or thinking "I'm not good enough, or I could never do that". Probably a year ago, I was thinking of stopping being DR and then we had this spring assembly planning meeting in person in Kona. And I got to actually be physically with these folks and the other DRs in this room and ignited in me that I'm not that bad. And I came back to district with a different perspective, because I spent physical time and after we've been locked on in little boxes, Hollywood Squares, as Penny calls it for so long, and it just gave me a breath of fresh air. So, what did I learn? And what am I excited about? It's that I learned that I've grown because you guys have acknowledged that to me. And I'm excited that we're all here. And we all get to do that too. Yes, it is about me. But it's also about each one of you, we all get to grow together. I'm so grateful for this part.
- I'm Anna from Kauai. It's my first Assembly and I really loved it. I've from now on when I got on off the plane, the person who came and picked me up was really sweet. And I got to see a waterfall. It was wow, we're gonna take me around everywhere. It was really neat. So just from the beginning, even from stepping into my first meeting, it's really about the people and the groups and, and a lot that I've learned is really just having the support from one another.
